Recently, invited by <u>Tanz Farm</u>, I traveled to Atlanta, Georgia and performed (watch the <u>video postcard</u>) at its busiest street corner. <u>The Goat Farm Arts Center</u> where I gave a workshop and a talk was a charming place, and the audiences were very attentive.

This week I was at Dickinson College in central Pennsylvania. In five days I performed in three sites both on campus and in town, guest-taught seven classes in three departments, gave one public video lecture about Fukushima, and had seven working meals with a wide range of professors and students. Throughout, I had delightful conversations with members of the Dickinson community and residents of Carlisle.

These engagements were different from my other tours because the people who invited me were choreographers/dancers: Lauri Stallings in Atlanta and Sarah Skaggs at Dickinson. Sarah initiated and co-hosted my residency with the <u>Clark Forum for Contemporary Issues</u>. According to Sarah, it was the first time that the Clark Forum invited an artist as its guest. In both cases, my hosts were partners in my adventures.
