COLORADO SPRINGS REFLECTIONS

Energized by working with Joan Jonas at Castelli Gallery and with Merián Soto at Princeton University, I returned to Colorado College for the spring convening and to change the videos in the exhibition from winter to spring.

The talks by our guests were engaging, most were in the form of public conversations: "Every time she came, we made something new happen to both Eiko and to ADF," said **Jodee Nimerichter**, the executive director of the American Dance Festival (ADF). **Brian Rogers**, director of The Chocolate Factory, had a dialogue with Jodee and me; **William Johnston** introduced the screening of **A Body in Fukushima**; **Karen Shimakawa** reflected on joining Bill and me in Fukushima in 2019; Karen and **Joshua Chambers-Letson** revealed their entire trajectory of seeing me perform over many years; and **Rosemary Candelario**, who focused on the use of my voice in my monologue and cries, conversed with **Pallavi Sriram**.

Elise Butterfield worked closely with me throughout preparation and the convening, in particular my presentation of *Recalling Slow Turn*. After six visitors shared their individual memories of seeing me perform *Slow Turn* on September 11, 2021, I performed alongside the video documentation that I edited. Commissioned for the 20th year memorial of 9/11, *Slow Turn* was occasion-and place-specific. While the piece can never be performed again, I tried to explore ways I could use my body along with the archival video in recalling 9/11.

A free performance on Saturday again attracted a new crowd from Colorado Springs, but those who attended *Recalling Slow Turn* earlier in the day would have recognized how I carried some material from the September 11 performance such as dirt, water, and black feathers.
