I performed and participated in a conversation with Rosemary Candelario at the 92nd Street Y later in May. She is a friend and the author of <u>Flowers Cracking</u> <u>Concrete: Eiko & Koma's Asian/American Choreographies</u>. 


Finally, I will be teaching a three-day Delicious Movement workshop at **Earthdance** in Plainfield, MA from August 31 to September 2. Please come and join!
