This recent presentation I did with William Johnston at Asia Society on November 18 was new to me. It was about painter Chikuha Otake, my grandfather who died 16 years before I was born. I did not have any personal memory or much knowledge about his work, but I grew up with his paintings and also knew he had a scandalous reputation.

So it was great to learn that the exhibition at the Asia Society, *Meiji Modern: Fifty Years of New Japan*, includes his painting. Having been invited to give a presentation about Chikuha, I did more research. Reading his essays and seeing more of his paintings made me curious. Reciting his essays in public made me feel connected to his thoughts. I found new photos and created videos for this occasion. The process was a journey and reminded me how I actually grew up with his painings.

If you have time to watch this video, you will meet my grandfather. Learning about Chikuha made me realize again how each artist is conditioned in a particular society and by its history. I got a better understanding of his shortcomings and overt passion, which I also find in myself.

It is hard to think about the past when the world now constantly demands our attention. However, engaging in matters of the past could offer the benefit of distance and with it a new appreciation of our commonality.

As always, Bill was a great collaborator. I can push any button on Bill and so much historical knowledge rushes out. Thank you to Bill and his wife, art historian Ikumi Kaminishi, for their guidance.
