I was truly happy to perform my solo project on the streets near the theater and also share <u>A Body in Fukushima</u> as a video lecture. After our short but precious stop at Anna Halprin's home in the Bay area, we spent six weeks in Japan visiting our mothers. I was delighted to teach three full day workshops in Tokyo in June. Kaito Abe and Kotaro Aoki (Wesleyan grads), and Shingo Umehara (a current Weslyan student), all from Japan, produced *Delicious Movement Workshop in Tokyo 2017*.





This is the first time that my student and his friends have produced a course from scratch. I had a diverse group of people of different ages, professions, nationalities, and concerns.
