### **PROVOKED**

Koma and I, for the first time, performed our solos back to back on April 20 in the entrance lobby of the Modern wing of Art Institute Chicago. This was somewhat significant for our many decades of performing together. Since 2014, I had many solo performances in different cities. Last summer the American Dance Festival presented each of our solos two months apart, and our long time friend David White presented both of our solos in the same week at the Yard on different days and at different locations. But in Chicago our solos were 15 feet apart spatially and 7 min apart time-wise. What prompted us to put our solos so close was the photo exhibition, <a href="PROVOKE: Photography in Japan between Protest and Performance, 1960-1975">PROVOKE: Photography in Japan between Protest and Performance, 1960-1975</a>, currently on view at Art Institute Chicago, closing this weekend. We were invited to perform in "response to" this exhibition, which contained our youth, inspirations, and political and aesthetic backgrounds.

This exhibition presents the works not only of the photographers who created the short-lived yet widely influential photo magazine Provoke, but also of the preceding and younger generations of the radical photographers. The exhibition was constructed with three connected parts: Provoke, Performances, and Protests. It illuminated how the inspirations, experiments, and influences of these artists were deeply connected to the actively staged political protests and newly expanded notions of performances.

When the earliest photo of the exhibition was taken, we were children. In the photos of late 60's and early 70's that are the heat of the exhibition, any young man and woman on the streets and in protests could have been Koma or me. I also remember seeing these photos, not in the galleries or in expensive photo books, but in inexpensive magazines and on the agitation-filled-walls of the students-occupied universities. Thus, we were both the subjects and the susceptible viewers of works by these energetic artists, one or two generations our senior. As such we were "provoked" for life.

Koma and I truly appreciated this occasion to experience the rigorously curated exhibition by Diane Dufour, Duncan Forbes, Walter Moser, and Matthew S. Witkovsky, and the vivid memories and reflections that were again "provoked" by the photos and talks in the gallery. Thanks to the performing curators who brought us there.
